The world is full of smart, resilient girls, but we don't often hear about them. From the production company that made *Hoop Dreams*, *5 Girls* shows girls as the heroes of their own lives. Shot over three years, the documentary tracks the lives of Corrie, Toby, Amber, Aisha and Haibinh as they move through their tumultuous teenage years.
