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## **‘When I Walk,’ a Soaring Tribute to the Powers of Creativity and Courage, Kicks Off POV’s 27th Season on PBS on Monday, June 23, 2014**

Diagnosis of Multiple Sclerosis Turns Filmmaker Jason DaSilva’s World Upside Down, Propelling Him on a Fateful Journey to Make Another Documentary

National Dates: Jason DaSilva’s **When I Walk** has its national broadcast premiere on **Monday, June 23, 2013** at 10 p.m. (check local listings), kicking off the 27th season of the award-winning PBS series **POV (Point of View)**. The Film: Jason DaSilva was 25 years old and a rising independent filmmaker when a diagnosis of multiple sclerosis changed everything—and inspired him to make another film. **When I Walk** is a candid and brave chronicle of one young man’s struggle to adapt to the harsh realities of M.S. while holding on to his personal and creative life. With his body growing weaker, DaSilva’s spirits, and his film, get a boost from his mothers tough love and the support of Alice Cook, who becomes his wife and filmmaking partner. The result is a life-affirming documentary filled with unexpected moments of joy and humor.

**When I Walk**, an Official Selection of the 2013 Sundance Film Festival, is a co-production of AXS Lab Inc. and ITVS, with support from the Sundance Institute Documentary Film Program. It is a co-presentation with the Center for Asian American Media.

Statement:

“At age 25, nine years ago, I was told I had multiple sclerosis, and I saw my freedoms slowly vanish,” says director/producer Jason DaSilva. “I wanted to capture this transformative experience—becoming disabled—in **When I Walk** because I hadn’t seen it done before, and people need to see how a degenerative disease impacts the lives of those living with it.

“My diagnosis was not the end of the world. Instead, and with a bit of determination, it has proven to be a new way for me to see and be in the world. This was the voice and heart that

emerged in the film, almost more through its own will than mine. As director, my role was to foster that spirit, to learn to adapt, and enjoy the ride.”

Jason DaSilva has been a prolific filmmaker for the past 10 years, directing four short films (*Olivia’s Puzzle*, *A Song for Daniel*, *Twins of Mankala* and *First Steps*) and two feature-length documentaries (*Lest We Forget* and **When I Walk**). Many of his films have won awards; *Olivia’s Puzzle* premiered at the 2003 Sundance Film Festival and qualified for an Academy Award®. Three of his films have been broadcast nationally on PBS and HBO and in Canada on CBC Television. He also produced *Shocking and Awful*, a film installation on the movement against the war in Iraq, exhibited at the 2006 Whitney Biennial.

In 2006, DaSilva took a short break from filmmaking to earn his master’s degree in applied media arts from Emily Carr University. He produced and directed an op-doc (opinion documentary) for *The New York Times* entitled *The Long Wait*, published in January 2013. He and Alice Cook live and work in New York City.

Alice Cook is a documentary filmmaker and producer living in New York City. **When I Walk** is her first production. She also produced and directed *The New York Times* op-doc *The Long Wait*, published in January 2013. She produced the digital media project AXS Map, which was funded by charitable giving from Google and other organizations. Cook received her bachelor’s and master’s degrees in engineering and science from Stanford University.

About AXS Map: In 2011, DaSilva and Cook received a grant from Google Earth Outreach and other foundations to build a prototype of [AXS Map](#) (pronounced access map), which uses new media technology to engage, empower, and connect the disability community. Through the AXS Map app and website, users are invited to search for businesses or public places that have accessible features such as entrances and washrooms, and then share their reviews with a 1- to 5-star rating. AXS Map will offer all people—including people with disabilities, seniors, and their supporters—freedom and spontaneity to make decisions about where they eat, shop, work and play.
